Even if you don't choose to pursue these two directions in digital imaging, Rick promises that having an understanding of these two techniques will make you a better traditional "still" photographer.

- Pass one light (Dutton St.) and continue to the second light (Estudillo Ave.)
- Turn right and continue for 5 blocks.
- The library is on the right side of the street a large, tan-colored brick and glass building with a parking lot in the front.

#### From 580 West ... coming from Tri-Valley area

- Take the Estudillo exit, which goes under the freeway.
- At the stop sign, turn right onto Grand Ave. for 1 short block, to the light (Estudillo Ave.)
- Turn left and continue for 5 blocks.
- The library is on the right side of the street a large, tan-colored brick and glass building with a parking lot in the front.

After learning the theory of Urban Photography and Image Composition discussed on Saturday May 10, 2014, this is an opportunity to learn how to turn that theory into practice. This Urban Photography Workshop is only open to a maximum of 10 participants to allow for personal interaction between Instructor Rick Hulbert and each attendee.

This workshop builds on the knowledge conveyed on the Day One event and includes 3 additional days of photographic education. May 11-13, 2014. (Mother's Day dinner break optional.)

While the illustrated lectures on May 10th will give you the fundamental information you need, This follow-up 3 Day workshop will devote a significant portion of time to both hands-on photography and daily constructive critiques of your own selected images which is a key part of the learning experience.

There is no requirement for fancy equipment. Any and every brand of camera will work. The principles taught will also apply to point and shoot cameras, new mirrorless cameras and even camera phones.

We will discuss the elementary basics of how people see, how the camera sees, and we will put into practice what was discussed on the May 10th full day event. This knowledge will apply whether you are wanting to document "reality" or you want to create a fine art interpretation of the built environment.

You will learn how to create jaw-dropping images that will be the envy of both your friends and relatives . . . and even potential future clients!

Over the 3 day period, the on site photography sessions will include providing one or more photo opportunities embracing the "Blue

Hour," "Sunrise," the "morning Golden Hour," "mid-day" photography, the "afternoon Golden Hour, "Sunset," "Dusk," and "early Evening Hour" photography. Discussion topics will include Image Pre-Visualization and Image Re-Visualization with the balance of the time spent reviewing images and where desired, a portfolio review will be provided.

We would start at 10am on Sunday, May 11, and conclude on Tuesday, May 13 at 5pm. The details for this follow-on 3 day workshop would be discussed on the first morning and the itinerary would be partially dependent upon weather and attendee interests.
